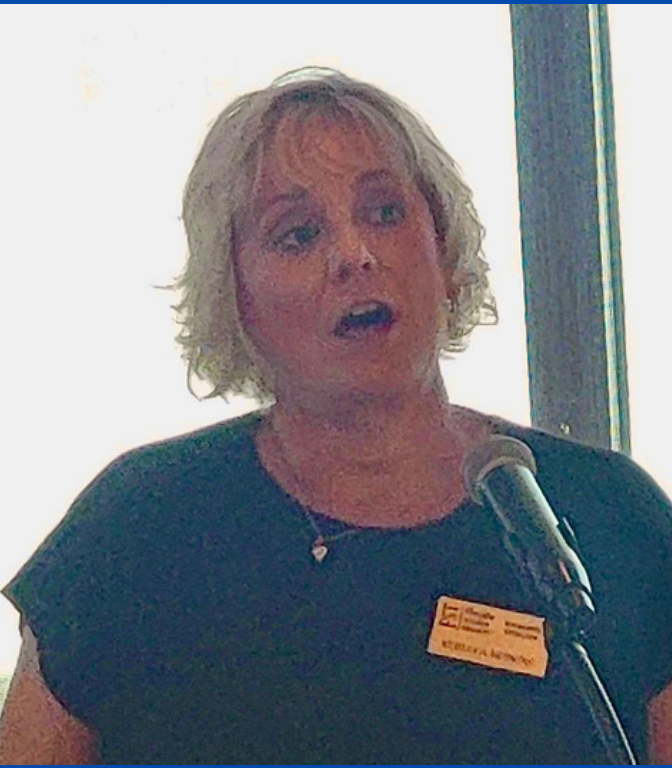
Welcome Back Party

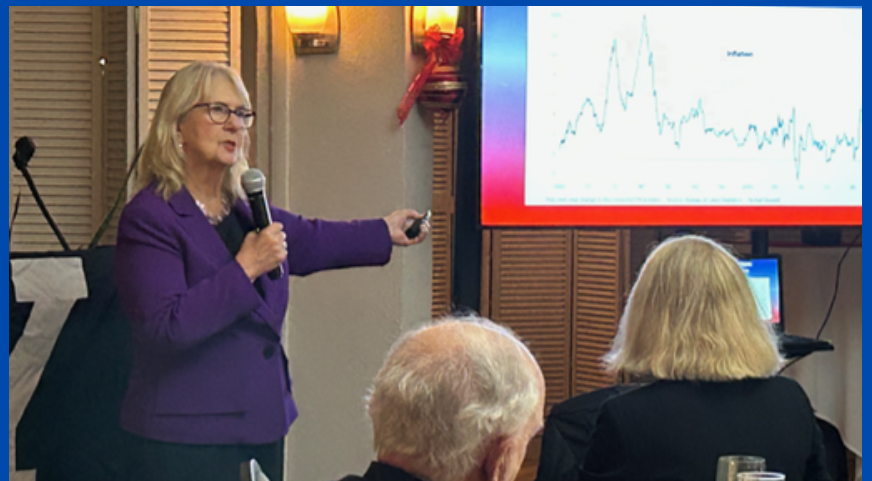


Recap of Recent Events

The first speaker of the 2024-2025 season was Mrs. Rebecca Hopkins, Managing Director and COO of Florida Studio Theatre. Thankfully, she used no slides but rather held the attention of our fidgety crowd with a captivating talk on how this Sarasota performing arts company has built the largest subscription audience in Florida, and now puts on not four, not six, but 20 professional productions a year.

Mrs. Hopkins described how, eight years ago, when FST was planning its construction projects, she and the Artistic Director traveled the country to question leaders of other theatres to hear what they thought they had done right, and done wrong, when they built facilities; and how FST adopted those lessons in its building plans. Perhaps the single most interesting fact was that they judged themselves by how low they could set ticket prices, and were proud that the top price for an entire winter season subscription is only \$179. And that the run of their sold-out hit show *Waitress* has just been extended to January.

On December 14, with the election behind us and her deep-dive analytics compiled, sliced, diced and graphed, the ever-popular Dr. Susan McManus explained Florida and national politics and the election results to a rapt crowd upstairs at Marina Jacks. While the election results may have surprised most of us, Dr. McManus said the data on trends and mood were readily available for analysis, and she faulted Kamala Harris' team of speechwriters and analysts for not adapting to them, and for using economic indicators rather than terms like "prices", that people could connect to. Most interestingly, she showed how Republicans and Democrats have traded places on traditional issues and socioeconomic demographics.

New President at Yale

Maurie McGinnis joined Yale in July 2024 as its 24th President and is a Professor in the History of Art Department. Coming to Yale from the Presidency at Stony Brook University and prior to that, as provost and executive vice-president at the University of Texas at Austin,, her career in higher education spans three decades in various research, teaching and leadership positions at several universities, including her alma mater, the University of Virginia. She did her graduate studies in art history at Yale.

President McGinnis is a recognized cultural historian and scholar in the politics of art and slavery. Her five books include ***Slaves Waiting for Sale: Abolitionist Art and the American Slave Trade*** and ***The Politics of Taste in Antebellum Charleston***.

New Course Offering at Yale:

Yale Professor of African American Studies Daphne Brooks will be teaching a new one-credit course on Beyonce and her cultural legacy. It will cover her music, fashion, and how she has dealt with the media, and will include consideration of Black intellectuals such as Frederick Douglass and Toni Morrison and “how we can apply their philosophies to her work.” Professor Brooks previously taught a similar course at Princeton.

January Luncheon: Adapting to Sea Level Rise: A Dynamic Approach, with Robert Mendelsohn '78 PhD, the Edwin Weyerhauser Davis Professor of Forest Policy at the Yale School of the Environment. Today, the gradual rise in sea levels is making storms ever more dangerous. How can coastal cities respond? In this presentation, Dr. Mendelsohn will step us through a dynamic approach that shoreline communities can take to protect themselves over time. As Prof. Mendelsohn will explain, the good news is that adaptation is effective; the bad news is that current federal policy discourages effective adaptation. He looks forward to taking our questions at the end of his presentation.
